## Tips to Raise an Honest Child

November Character Trait

1. Model honesty– Don't lie to them and do not let them hear you telling lies: it sends a mixed message.

2. Discipline calmly– Harsh punishments teach children to lie earlier and more skillfully as a protective measure.

3. Teach tact- your child can be honest without being hurtful

4. Don't set them up- don't ask them if they did it: you're giving an option to lie. Focus on what you want accomplished instead of who did what.

5. Don't reward the lie- children tend to lie to avoid a consequence.

6. Say truth-telling makes you happy- it will increase child's likelihood to be honest.

7. Catch them being honest-look for opportunities to acknowledge when they tell the truth

8. Tell positive stories – highlight the positive consequences of telling the truth instead of the negative
